

# Listeners Dig Deep to Help

### Special On-Air Appeal Brings in \$400,000 for Red Cross Disaster Fund

It was a different kind of pledge drive Sept. 9th on Vermont Public Radio.

VPR broadcast a day long on-air fundraising appeal to support hurricane Katrina relief efforts, collecting more than \$400,000 from 2,604 listeners. All of the money raised has been given to the American Red Cross Disaster Relief Fund and is being used for ongoing relief efforts.

VPR donated the costs of conducting and coordinating the on-air appeal, with VPR on-air personalities and staff taking incoming calls alongside 63 VPR volunteers over the course of the 13-hour drive.

"We are simply amazed and very touched at the generosity of VPR listeners," said Robin Turnau, vice president of development for VPR. "We didn't know what to expect, and after raising nearly \$70,000

in the first two hours, we just tried to keep up with the calls and online pledges. Public radio listeners share an incredible sense of community, and together we're helping Gulf Coast residents rebuild their communities."

Turnau shared that VPR staff and volunteers felt that this was the best way




### Visit Salzburg, Austria with Olin Robison April 7-15

they could help with hurricane relief. "As a public radio station, we regularly ask our listeners to contribute financial support," she said. "With our experience and with the established phone lines and processing systems we have for on-air fund raisers, along with hundreds of dedicated volunteers, it was a natural step for our staff to coordinate the drive. It also gave VPR listeners a trusted, secure place to which they could donate, knowing that their donation would assist hurricane survivors."

Volunteer Carolyn Stevens of Northfield said of the experience, "VPR should be very proud of its listeners - a number of them said they were grateful to VPR and

proud that the station was doing this. It really does feel like more than a radio station - it is more like a community - a community that extends far beyond the borders of this state. We're very lucky. Thanks again for putting it all together!"

Another phone volunteer, David Gervais of Burlington, said he had to be there to help: "I had only a few hours to spare on Friday... It was not only Vermonters who called, but contributors from Quebec, New York and New Hampshire. I'm so proud to have been able to contribute to such a successful campaign."

VPR joined thousands of other broadcasters in an

effort promoted by the National Association of Broadcasters. Turnau explained that a request was filed on behalf of NPR-member stations with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), to waive restrictions on fundraising for other non-profit organizations.

"Normally public radio stations cannot raise funds for anyone else other than the station; but, given the enormity of the relief effort, the FCC made the exception. We're

very pleased that other broadcasters are participating in this effort."

The depth and breadth of the outpouring was amazing," said Jay Sames of Barre. "I was struck by how many people thanked me for volunteering to answer phones, as if that were such a big deal, as though all that stood between them and their generosity was a credible place to send the money. VPR provided that place, expertise and their system for collecting donations."

The experience of helping also put VPR's role into perspective for volunteer Gil Myers of Essex: "I am still thinking about the call I got Friday. The man asked about how many phones and volunteers were there. He then said: 'You have all the equipment and experienced volunteers to do this?' I told him yes and he said: 'Who else in the state could respond that well or as quickly?'"

# VPR to Air Aiken Lectures, *Switchboard* to Explore Issues

This year University of Vermont's George D. Aikens Lectures aims to celebrate its 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary with a series of talks tackling some of our future's most serious issues.

Vermont Public Radio is collaborating with UVM, playing a vital role in broadcasting the lecture series to reach a regional audience. Listeners will then be able to discuss these global issues and their local impact with VPR's public affairs program, *Switchboard*.

"This is a great opportunity for VPR to bring its regional audience a thoughtful, informative series exploring tough global issues and bring the discussion to a local level, " said Jody Evans, VPR's director of programming. "VPR's partnership with UVM provides an opportunity to hear from nationally renowned experts and expands the audience for an important lecture series like this."

VPR will broadcast each lecture as presentation of VPR Presents on the Thursday following the lecture. VPR Presents will air at 6 pm and will be followed at 7 pm by a live call-in *Switchboard* to continue the discussion.

This year, the lecture series will also feature two showings of the new film about Aiken's life. The documentary chronicals the life of Aiken (1892-1984), farmer, horticulturist, author, Vermont governor from 1937-1941 and U.S. Senator for the next 34 years. The film will be shown Nov. 9 in Montpelier and Nov. 11 in Burlington.

The public is invited to attend the free lectures and movies, but tickets must be reserved. The *Visioning the Future and Vermont* programs will be held from 6 to 7 p.m. at UVM's Ira Allen Chapel.



• Five Big Questions About the Future, Sept. 29. Atul DIghe, a consulting futurist, will discuss the key issues facing Vermont's future. Broadcast Oct. 6 at 6 p.m., followed by Switchboard at 7 p.m.

• Human Face of Globalization: Oct. 17. Jagdish Bhagwati, Columbia University professor and senior fellow in international economics at the Council on Foreign Relations, will speak on how local choices have far-reaching impact. Bhagwati will illustrate how individuals can influence the global marketplace. Broadcast on VPR Nov. 3 at 6 p.m., followed by Switchboard at 7 p.m.

• The History and Future of Vermont's Landscape: Feb. 15. Jan Albers and Darby Bradley review how economic, government and industry pressures have changed Vermont's landscape throughout its history and might be likely to change it in the future. Albers, a historian, is author of *Hands on the Land: A History of the Vermont Landscape*. Bradley is president of the Vermont Land Trust. Broadcast on VPR Feb. 23, 2006 at 6 p.m., followed by *Switchboard* at 7 p.m.

• The Future of Healthcare: Health and Wellbeing: March 14. Dr. David Satcher, who was United States Surgeon General from 1998-2002, will go beyond the current debate about the healthcare crisis and explore the role of individual empowerment and responsibility in the only long-term solution: staying well. Broadcast on VPR March 23, 2006 at 6 p.m. followed by Switchboard at 7 p.m.
